The Health Sciences Library staff can:

- Help you to comply with Canadian copyright requirements.
- Review your content and help identify which items (images, articles, books, etc) are available electronically.
- Provide special url links to digital material - these provide stability over time and automatically prompt for off-campus access for restricted resources
- Identify sources for copyright cleared images
- Assist in searching for new, alternate or updated content.
- Help generate complete citations.
- Outline options for organizing and maintaining links to content.
- Work with you, HSIMS, DELT, or your admin support in posting your content.

OPTIONS FOR LINKS TO DIGITAL MATERIALS

1. An individual url for each item -

Proxy-wrapped urls for e-books - route directly to one source and prompt for off-campus login where appropriate

Format: <http://library-proxy.mun.ca/Login?url=http://online.statref.com./TOC.aspx?grpalias=MUN&FxlD=18>

Open Url Links for journal articles: these embed citation information, provide stability, prompt for off-campus login where appropriate, and may offer multiple sources via the familiar "Get it At" resolver -

2. Electronic Reserves - group multiple items under one url

This uses option 1 plus customized links into the library catalogue and allows for greater support by the library in maintaining and updating content. Access to content can be from the HSL website (by instructor or course or group) but it can also be via a customized link embedded into D2L for example, pasted on any webpage (course website, intranet, blog, etc), or shared by email. You can organize readings by units (topic, year, lecturer) or as one single list.

3. Refworks - groups multiple items under a "refshare" url link, and uses an embedded "GetitAt" button to link to individual items.

SOURCES FOR IMAGES

1. [Anatomy.tv](#)

Memorial subscription. Non-commercial/non-profit use of images, slides and animations is allowed and does not require any additional permission or license. However, Primal Pictures Ltd must always be credited as the source of the images as they maintain the intellectual property rights and copyright to the material.

2. [Netanatomy.com](#)

Memorial subscription. Members of Memorial are allowed to print individual pages or screens from the website using their web browser's Print command or to screen capture individual images or screens for noncommercial, institution-sanctioned purposes. Source should be credited.

3. [Springer Images](#)

Memorial subscription. For Springer-owned content, members of Memorial may use images for personal non-commercial use without further permission during the subscription (see further detail below). Source should be given. Each image includes the source information of the article from which the image originates and a link to the full-text. This information is also included in the download to ppt feature for easy use. Members of Memorial may:

- Access, browse, copy, collate, display, search, bookmark, retrieve, display and use the Content for educational, personal, scientific, or research purposes, including illustration, explanation, example, comment, criticism, teaching, research or analysis in accordance with these Terms of Use.
- Download or create printouts of certain Content under certain restrictions and conditions. All reproduction and distribution of such printouts, and all downloading and electronic storage of materials retrieved through the Content shall be for your own internal, personal or scholarly use.
- provide to a third party colleague minimal, insubstantial amounts of the Content for personal use or scholarly, educational or scientific research use in hard copy or electronically, provided that in no case any such sharing is done in a manner or magnitude as to act as a replacement for the recipient's or recipient institution's own subscription to either the Content.

NOTE: license information is given under the details for each image, some are not from Springer publications but are under Creative Commons license.

6. Images in MDConsult

Users may print or download images for their **personal, non-commercial use** provided that all copyright and other proprietary notices are kept intact. Images, video clips etc. can be embedded into presentations, or into D2L course content, as long as it is for educational purposes.

To use images in a poster, publication, or for any other similar use, **permission must be requested** through the [Elsevier Rights Department](#).
